

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



another milestone in the history of Upper Merion education. A complete contingent of School District officials and guests witnessed the laying of the cornerstone of the township's new three and one-quarter million dollar high school, located on Crossfield Road, King of Prussia. Fred Baehr, president of the School Board, delivered the main address to approximately one hundred fifty persons. Dr. Harold F. Martin, Superintendent of Schools, Fred Baehr, and Robert R. Strine, high school principal, officially laid the cornerstone. Following this, Mr. Baehr and Mr. Strine placed the cornerstone documents in the wall. Each delivered, a brief address, extolling the past history of Upper Merion education, and predicted continued progress in the future. The high school band played appropriate selections during the hour long ceremony.

> On October 29, 1960, the dedication of the new ultramodern Upper Merion Senior High School took place. The formalities opened with a dinner in the new cafeteria with Director, Mrs. Frederick J. Whalen, presiding. Following the invocation by Rev. William Loane and the introduction of the distinguished guests, Dr. Bertrand W. Hayward, president of Philadelphia Textile Institute, gave the address.

> Following the dinner, the guests adjourned to the auditorium for the dedication program, with more than eight hundred in attendance. The Upper Merion band and chorus presented music honoring the occasion. Rev. Herbert H. Beardsley delivered the invocation, followed by the welcome address by Dr. Harold F. Martin. Fred Baehr, past president of the School Board, spoke concerning the new school and extended greetings to state officials. The dedicatory speaker was Director Robert B. Lowry.

> Dr. Kenneth B. Wells, president of Freedoms Foundation, gave an address entitled, "Let the Voice of Freedom Ring." Director Bernard Livingston presented the dedicatory plaque, which was unveiled by Larry Smerglia and Joyce Maloney. The program concluded with the Alma Mater by the band,


